## Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Overview and Discussion

- Juliana Herman, DCPS Deputy Chief of Policy, presented information about the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), School Report Cards, and the School Reporting and Transparency (STAR) Framework.
  - Juliana spoke about DCPS's commitment to supporting schools in response to the STAR ratings including plans for community engagement, a districtwide improvement framework, supports for schools with one-star ratings and

approaches to accelerating progress in DCPS's lowest performing schools (refer to pages 9-10 in the presentation).

- Questions/comments from attendees included:
  - "Comprehensive" schools should be able to use funds made available through
    OSSE however they see fit without additional requirements.
    - There will be a menu of transformation strategies that schools will use
    - Community Schools or other models that provide family support, mental health support, and other community supports should be components of any improvement strategies
    - Resources at DCPS Central Office should also be spread out in a way that supports schools most in need
  - DCPS should consider what strategies have been employed previously to improve schools (40/40 schools) in order to glean best practices and ensure that efforts that did not work are not repeated. Practices are more important than the funding.
  - There were conflicting thoughts about the timeline for this:
    - There was agreement that we should move swiftly because there is a clear need right now.
    - However, the overall ESSA timeline for schools to improve in three years did not feel like enough time.
  - Fear that ratings will stigmatize schools and harm morale of parents, staff and others in school communities who receive a low rating. There was a strong sense from parents in the room that "ratings matter".
    - DCPS should ensure that supports are in place for schools to communicate effectively with their communities about their rating.
    - Support for students will be important-there was a suggestion that schools have an assembly to ensure students understand the ratings as well as families.
  - o Consider how to allay fears that this may lead to school closures or privatization.

# Bard Early College East of the River Overview and Discussion

- Millissa Hare, DCPS Specialist for Early College and Dual Enrollment Programs shared information about the Early College Model and the Bard Program (refer to pages 15-20 in the presentation).
- Questions/comments from attendees included:
  - o How many students will be able to earn their Associate of Arts (A.A.) degrees?
  - How are students in other early college sites (School Without Walls) selected for their program?

- Ensure we build in equitable opportunities for our lowest performing students with this process
- o Interest in more information and possible in-person and virtual tour of Bard
- Why does the admissions criteria require a recommendation from a math teacher?

## **Bard Location Discussion**

- Matthew Floca, DCPS Director of Facility Management led a discussion about considerations for the location of the Bard Early College site, which will be located East of the River in either Ward 7 or 8.
- Matt discussed short and long-term considerations and also discussed pros and cons with the group around a shared, co-located school site versus a stand-alone site.
- Questions/comments from attendees included:
  - Participants expressed a clear preference for the program to have its own standalone site as opposed to co-locating with another school.
  - DCPS should get feedback from other principals who have experienced schools co-locating.
- DCPS will solicit more feedback on potential sites from the CWG before the next meeting take place in late November, possibly through a conference call or online survey.
