STEP 4: DCPS and CWG work together on final recommendation for the for Chancellor (Oct)


50 Total Nominations Received





Black Women were the most popular demographic of submitted nominees


African-American women represent a plurality of individuals nominated by respondents. African-American men and women together comprise the majority of all nominees that were submitted to the School Planning team.
